

ANZIP AUSTRALIA NEW ZEALAND INFRASTRUCTURE PIPELINE

The Australia & New Zealand Infrastructure Pipeline (ANZIP) provides a forward view of public infrastructure activity across Australia and New Zealand, providing certainty of the forward work programme to investors, constructors, governments and other agencies. ANZIP informs industry of where and what infrastructure opportunities are available, and when they come to market by tracking greenfield and brownfield transactions from when they are proposed, until they reach contractual and financial close.

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STATUS DEFINITIONS

Prospective pipeline

Greenfield (construction) or brownfield (government asset divestment) projects needed or likely to occur within the next five years, but is not formally proposed by a state, territory or major local government.

Credibly Proposed

The project or divestment is supported by a state, territory or major local government, is subject to studies or other processes (such as pre-feasibility or scoping studies or business case development), and is likely to proceed to formal announcement

Announced

The project has a firm commitment and timeline from a state, territory or major local government, but has not yet entered the market.

Under procurement

The project or transaction is under procurement (such as a call for Expressions of Interest, requests for tender, or another offer to the market).

Preferred bidder announced

A preferred bidder has been selected and is in exclusive negotiations.

Recently closed

Projects that have progressed to contractual close remain on ANZIP for 12 months.

In November 2018, the Federal Government announced \$498 million to redevelop the Australian War Memorial in Canberra.

The redevelopment will increase visitor areas by 83 per cent or around 10,000 square metres to expand the exhibition and public program space which is currently at capacity. It will include:

- a new temporary exhibition space
- improved visitor orientation, wayfinding, and amenities
- areas for respite and reflection
- new education facilities
- a theatre and functions space
- a space to be used by veterans' organisations
- two electronic displays.

The War Memorial held a public consultation on the redevelopment plans in August and September 2018. A summary report will be publicly available by mid-December 2018.

In November 2019, official development plans for the nine-year Australian War Memorial Development Project were unveiled. The plan was open for public feedback from 19 November to 13 December 2019. As part of the public consultation, the Memorial has also established an on-site information gallery where the detailed plans can be viewed.

Project Timeline

2018: Development project announced by the Prime Minister, Hon, Scott Morrison MP

2019: Early works begin

2020: Anzac Hall site preparations begin

2021: Southern entrance works begin

2022: Southern entrance external works complete

2023: Anzac Hall and glazed link open, southern entrance opens, C.E.W. Bean Building and Research Centre open

2024: Main building lower refurbishments and galleries begin

2025: Main building upper refurbishments begin
